7th Meeting of the National Skills Qualifications Committee (NSQC)

The 7^{th} meeting of the National Skills Qualifications Committee (NSQC) was held on 18^{th} June 2015 in New Delhi. Mr. S. Ramadorai, Chairman, NSDA, chaired the meeting.

The list of participants is at **Annexure I**.

Agenda Item No. 1: Approval of Minutes of the 6th Meeting of NSQC

There were no further comments on the minutes of the 6th NSQC Meeting and the same were treated as approved.

At the outset, the Chairman, in his opening remarks, emphasized on the following:

Outcome-based Focus: All skill development training in the country should be outcomes based and performance needs to be measured in terms of percentage of persons actually placed in wage or self-employment. Industry partners who validate the QPs must ensure that they also employ the candidates trained against these QPs at the same level. Each of these QPs should be tracked for training and employment/entrepreneurship record.

Importance of the commonality of purpose: The Qualification Files are meant for all users – candidates as well as employers. Hence, the Qualification File must contain sufficient information presented in a manner that is understood by all so that the end users can use these files to suit their requirements and expectations.

Agenda Item No. 2: Action Taken Report

DG, NSDA provided an update on the action taken by NSDA since the last NSQC Meeting held on 19th May 2015 and they are listed as under:

2.1 Formation of a Sub-Committee for Accreditation Norms for Training Providers:

DG, NSDA informed that, as approved in the last NSQC meeting, DDGT or his representative has been made a part of the sub-committee that has been

constituted under NSQC to review the accreditation norms developed by the SSCs and develop a common model of accreditation norms to be adopted across sectors as national standard of accrediting training providers.

It was also informed that, as a first step, accreditation norms were sought from Sector Skills Councils and 19 SSCs have sent their accreditation norms till date. These SSCs include Agriculture, Apparel, Automotive, Beauty and Wellness, Capital Goods, Construction, Electronics, Healthcare, Infrastructure, Logistics, Life Sciences, Plumbing, Power, Retail, Rubber, Telecom, Textile, Tourism and Food Processing. The remaining 10 SSCs (BFSI), Gems and Jewellery, Handicrafts, Iron and Steel, IT/ITeS, Leather, Media and Entertainment, Mining, Sports and Security) have been requested to submit their accreditation norms to the NSDA. The sub-committee would submit its report on or before 28th June 2015. (Action: NSDA)

2.2 Formation of a Sub-Committee for RPL Guidelines:

DG, NSDA informed that, as approved in the last NSQC meeting, representatives of DDGT and NCVT have been made a part of the sub-committee constituted under NSQC to evaluate and finalize the draft guidelines for RPL developed by the NSDA.

It was also informed that the first meeting of the sub-committee on RPL was held on 27.05.2015, with the aim to deliberate upon the draft guidelines that were shared with the sub-committee members. Members from Gems and Jewellery SSC and NIOS participated in this meeting. In addition, comments were received from Agriculture SSC, LabourNet, BAble and NIOS via email. The issues highlighted by the members present during the first meeting would be considered while finalizing the guidelines and the same would be shared with the NSOC.

The sub-committee would submit its report on or before 28th June 2015. (Action: NSDA)

2.3 Process of Curriculum Development and Involvement of Subject Matter Experts:

It was informed that a formal letter had been sent by DG, NSDA to NSDC as well as DDGT requesting them to submit their process and list of subject matter specialists to the NSDA. In response, NSDA has received a letter from DDGT regarding the process of curriculum development adopted by NCVT as well as complete list of members and core group of Mentor Councils involved as subject matter experts for NCVT courses.

Response is still awaited from NSDC. NSDC has been requested to submit the same at the earliest. (Action: NSDC)

Agenda Item No. 3: NSDA's update on NSQF related activities

3.1 Discussion regarding providing evidence of level for approving Qualification Packs

DG, NSDA updated the committee that, following the last NSQC Meeting, NSDA had several rounds of deliberations with NSDC and SSCs regarding the Qualification File to agree upon a format so that evidence of level for every QP is presented in a uniform and transparent manner. Keeping in mind the suggestions as well as constraints of SSCs in filling the Qualification File, the format for presenting 'Evidence of Level' in the Qualification File had been revised. As per the new format, the NSQF level of every QP needs to be justified with respect to each of the level descriptors as per the NSQF notification.

Accordingly, the committee was informed that the revised section on Evidence of Level of the Qualification File, with the necessary guidelines that explains what is actually expected from every SSC to justify the NSQF level assigned to every QP, had been circulated to NSDC and SSCs.

3.2 NSQF Roll Out Plan for States

DG, NSDA informed that in pursuance to the objective implementing NSQF at the State level in a time bound manner, NSDA has prepared a phase-wise list of activities to be undertaken by NSDA officials with the States, that include initial interaction by sharing E-Kits on NSQF, organizing workshops with all state level stakeholders and provide handholding support to align Qualifications provided by institutions under State Govt. through the Qualifications Register.

The process has been initiated for the States of Punjab, Uttarakhand, Tamil Nadu, Odisha and Rajasthan.

3.3 Workshop with Maharashtra Centre for Entrepreneurship Development (MCED)

DG, NSDA informed that, as requested by MCED, Govt. of Maharashtra, NSDA had participated in a two-day workshop with the concerned officials from MCED regarding NSQF Alignment of their courses. MCED is an autonomous society working under Directorate of Industries, Govt. of Maharashtra and

they are running 150 different trades on skill development and entrepreneurship.

3.4 Workshop with Uttarakhand on NSQF

DG, NSDA informed that, as part of NSDA's plan for rolling out NSQF in States, a workshop was organised conducted by the NSDA with the Uttarakhand State Skill Mission and other stakeholders regarding implementation of NSQF at the State level. Since Uttarakhand has been selected for offering technical assistance under ADB, the team member from ADB had also participated at this workshop. The State has been advised to form an internal working group at the State level, which will gather information of all trainings taking place within the State that would be targeted for NSQF compliance. The ADB team would support the State in this endeavor. The state has proposed a meeting with the Chief Secretary and all the Departments in the state where NSDA will be invited. In this meeting, a coordination mechanism between the departments on skill training will be formalized and structure and functions of UKSDM would be discussed.

3.5 Timeline for Submission of Qualification Files by SSCs

Given the pressing need to complete the exercise of filling the Qualification Files for all the 1319 QPs developed so far by 10th July 2015, it is extremely important that submission of the Qualification Files to NSDA is done in a phased manner so that adequate time could be given systematic review and revision. In this regard, the NSDA had prepared a schedule for submission of the remaining Qualification Files, which was subsequently shared with the NSDC and the SSCs. DG, NSDA informed that while the estimated target of submission of Qualification Files was 508 (until 10th June 2015), a total of 385 Qualification Files have been submitted to the NSDA.

All the concerned SSCs have been advised to take note of the same and plan their exercise accordingly so that the deadlines can be met as per the schedule. Given the Committee's decision during the 5th NSQC meeting that, QPs, which are not approved by NSQC, would not be used in PMKVY scheme, the SSCs should be more proactive and speed up the process of submission of Qualification Files to the NSDA as the PMKVY scheme has already been launched.

(Action: NSDC, SSCs)

Agenda Item No. 4: Approval of Qualification Files for NCVT/SDIS courses

Representative from DDGT presented 31 Qualifications under NCVT for approval by NSQC. Details of these qualifications are at **Annexure II**.

It was pointed out by DDGT that these qualifications have been mapped to the relevant NOSs wherever applicable. NSDC informed that they have mapped around 70-80 popular courses of NCVT to relevant QPs and they have agreed to provide resource persons to NCVT in order to facilitate the mapping of NCVT qualifications to QPs, if required. Once this exercise is over, it was decided that the review team at NSDA would evaluate their Qualification Files and the same would be presented in the next NSQC meeting. (Action: DDGT, NSDC, NSDA)

Agenda Item No. 5: Approval of QPs submitted by various SSCs

The Committee was informed that 385 QPs across 20 SSCs have been submitted to the NSDA until 10th June 2015. Out of these, 301 QPs were presented before the NSQC and they have been approved. The sector-wise summary of the number of these QPs is presented below:

Details of these QPs are at Annexure III.

Some of the recommendations of the Committee are summarized as under:

- **5.1 Entry Requirement**: The entry requirement for each of the Qualification/QPs should indicate
 - Minimum educational qualification for direct entry
 - Progression from Qualification/QPs pegged at lower NSQF levels with minimum work experience and/or bridge course, if applicable.

During the presentations by SSCs, it was observed that there are QPs for which the entry requirement is specified as Class X, Class XII and above. Given the high number of school dropouts in the country, it is possible that candidates with such educational qualification would not be available (particularly in rural areas). This also becomes a pertinent factor in considering RPL certification. The SSCs should consider how to mobilise candidates for such QPs so that skill development training could reach out to maximum number of candidates. In this regard, SSCs are advised to consider entry-level qualifications as 'preferable' in the Qualification Files so that candidates with lower educational qualifications with adequate years of work experience can also be trained under such circumstances. (Action: SSCs)

- **5.2 Progression Pathways**: Except Healthcare and Life Sciences SSC, the exact progression, both vertical and horizontal, have not been clearly stated in the Qualification Files. Although, the occupational map is attached for every sector while submitting the Qualification files as evidence of career progression, the same is not adequate because the occupational map is meant for the entire sector and it becomes difficult to locate the progression pathways for every QP distinctly. SSCs must mention the pathways of progression for every QP, both horizontal and vertical, in the Qualification File. **(Action: SSCs)**
- **5.3 Industry Validation**: As per NSDC norms all the QPs and NOSs developed by SSCs are supposed to be validated by a minimum of 30 Industries representing the sector. It appears that there are some QPs that have not been validated by minimum 30 industries, the reason given by such SSCs is that a smaller number of industry covers major part of the sector. It is important to know the percentage of workers, of the total workforce in their sector, employed by these industries which validate the QPs. The true meaning of industry validation would be established when SSCs can convince industries, which validate their QPs, to hire the candidates certified by the SSCs.

5.3.1 SSCs are requested to provide a detailed process manual stating the exact procedure that is adopted while validating QPs. This should clearly indicate how these industries are chosen, their classification into small, medium and large and the definition adopted by these SSCs for such classification. (Action: SSCs)

5.3.2 It was suggested that sector-wise workshops should be held between the NSDA and the industry representatives involved in validation of QPs, in order to understand the process of validation in a better manner. (Action: NSDA, NSDC, SSCs)

5.4 Comments on QPs submitted by Leather and Rubber SSCs

It has been observed by the Committee that QPs in both the Rubber and Leather Sector appear to be narrow which points towards an assembly line kind of operations in these sectors. In such cases capturing Evidence of Need and Occupational Maps in the Qualification file is even more crucial, which is not shown in the current files that have been submitted. Training candidates as per such narrow QPs might increase their vulnerability towards change in technology. Also, such QPs may not be applicable in the unorganized sector. It was decided a separate meeting would be held between NSDA and representatives from these sectors to discuss these issues. (Action: NSDA and Leather/Rubber SSCs)

Agenda Item No. 6: Approval of Qualification by Maharashtra Centre for Entrepreneurship Development (MCED)

MCED had submitted their Qualification File on Retail Management Training Programme for approval by the NSQC. However, certain shortcomings have been observed by the review team at NSDA, and they have been advised to revise their Qualification File accordingly so that the same may be taken up in the next NSQC meeting. (Action: MCED)

Agenda Item No. 7: National Quality Assurance Framework

NSDA made a presentation on the outline of National Quality Assurance Framework that has been prepared by the NSDA with EU assistance. The National Quality Assurance Framework will underpin the NSQF by addressing the quality of

registration and use of qualifications, and also the accreditation of training providers and assessment agencies, as well as monitoring and evaluation by national and state level bodies. DG, NSDA had circulated a copy of the framework to the NSQC members along with the agenda of the 7th NSQC meeting, and requested the members of the NSQC to provide their inputs and suggestions on the same. (Action: NSDA, NSQC)
